The Joint BPA/DECA Fall Leadership Conference took place on Thursday, November 9, 2006. Statewide members met at the University of Delaware's Clayton Hall. The FLC was similar to the DECA Leadership Summit earlier this year, except members enjoyed more networking opportunities offered through larger numbers of DECA members. Members came from

each DECA chapter in the state, in addition to the BPA members who attended from other high schools.

After a light breakfast, visits to college displays, and the opening session, delegates attended two joint BPA/DECA workshops led by community business leaders and presenters from the area. Topics of the workshops included everything from teamwork to community service. Then members moved on to their third workshop of the day, which was specific to the member's organization and led by the State Officer teams.

The day wrapped up with lunch and a closing session with a slideshow to highlight

the day's activities. Following the "Racing into Leadership" theme, everyone in attendance received a "Racing into Leadership" pin at the conclusion of the conference. As always, it is the hope of the officer team that all members bring information learned at the conference back to their local chapters in order to better each individual group, making Delaware DECA better as a whole. Development Conference. With the CDC less than two months away, the officer team hopes that you have spent your time wisely and have been volunteering as a chapter.



Chapter Spotlight

Caesar Rodney DECA Raises \$47,000 for ALS!



In the spring of 2006 our superintendent of Caesar Rodney High School (Camden, DE) Dr. Harry Roberts, was tragically diagnosed with Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS). ALS is a terminal illness more commonly known as Lou Gehrig's Disease. As members of DECA (An Association of Marketing Students) and the students who run our school store we decided that we had the power to make a difference and organize a project in which we could raise money for ALSA (ALS Association). It all began when we started selling \$2 "Strike Out ALS" wristbands in our school store. From there we designed a "Strike Out ALS" t-shirt and it was a hit. At this point we were more motivated than ever and after getting just a little taste of what it felt like to give back to others and raise money for a life changing cause, we dove in head first to uncharted waters.

In our small group of planners, including Emily Warren (17), Jessey Appel (17), Rosemarie McGreevy (17), Brittany Lawrence (17), and Tyler Scott (17) all seniors at Caesar Rodney High School we collectively decided on hosting a walk to honor Dr. Roberts. We titled it "Laps of Love, Riders Walk for ALS" and set the date for November 11, 2006. Going into the project blind, without any past experience in planning or organizing walks, we learned as we went through the project that it was much more difficult than we had anticipated. With only two months until the walk we had a lot of work ahead of us. We worked day in and day out for two months to further educate ourselves and our community.

Through the support of the community, corporate sponsors, those connected to ALS patients, and others who were there solely for Dr. Roberts we were able to exceed our original goal of \$7,000 and raise over \$47,000. This money is to be split up and distributed to national ALS chapters which will go to patient care/services, ALS research, and public awareness of the disease. With the walk day behind us we are finally able to sit back and not only admire, but reflect on the work that we accomplished. This is by far the largest and most successful project we, as a DECA group have ever put together and are able to take credit for.
